Overview

A framework for measuring data literacy program maturity and genuine business impact — behavioral change indicators, decision-quality outcomes, and maturity stage assessment — rather than relying on training completion or self-reported confidence as the primary measure of a data literacy initiative's success.

Isn't training completion rate a reasonable proxy for data

literacy program success? Completion measures participation, not genuine capability change or behavioral impact — a data literacy program can have high completion rates while producing minimal actual change in how people make decisions, which is the outcome that actually matters.
