Overview

A framework for building data literacy within project and program management offices — status reporting critical reading, leading versus lagging indicator distinction, and portfolio-level pattern recognition — addressing the specific risk of PMOs relying on self-reported status data that tends toward optimism bias until problems are too advanced to easily correct.

PMOs already track detailed project status data — isn't that

already strong data literacy? Extensive tracking isn't the same as critical reading — self-reported project status data (RAG ratings, milestone completion) is well- documented to carry systematic optimism bias, and genuine data literacy means knowing how to read through this bias, not just collecting more status data.

What's the most reliable early-warning signal a PMO can track,

beyond self-reported status? Leading indicators specific to project execution (velocity trend, issue resolution rate, milestone slippage pattern) tend to reveal problems earlier and more reliably than lagging, self-reported RAG status, which is covered specifically in the framework below.

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
